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semester. An event spearheaded by brothers **Colin Beecham (M 2694)** and **Matt Brown (M 2701**), Jam for Cam was the largest privately held Greek Event in the University's history. The event, which was held on November 9th, welcomed over 7,000 patrons and raised over \$50,000 for Camp Carolina and Melanoma Research. I could not be prouder of the countless hours our members and advisors put in to ensure that the entire community remembers our brother, Cam.



MU CHAPTER LOSES A MIGHTY OAK

VERNER CHAFFIN

On April 27th, 2018, **Dr. Verner Chaffin (M 621)** passed away at the age of 99. Dr. Chaffin, one of the Mighty Oaks of Sigma Nu, was one of the most dedicated and influential men to be a part of Mu Chapter. Not only was he an admirable Commander and sterling professor of Law at UGA, but he remained a dedicated brother to the chapter even in his later years. In his nineties, Dr. Chaffin was still writing hand written letters to rushees. His career in academia sent him to a variety of schools; Dr. Chaffin started school at UGA in 1936 and after only 6 years he graduated Summa Cum Laude from UGA's graduate Law School. While at UGA, Dr. Chaffin was lucky enough to serve as the first Commander in the newly constructed Chateau. However, his time in the house would be bittersweet as Dr. Chaffin was the active Commander on December 7th, 1941 when Japan bombed Pearl Harbor. Upon his graduation in 1942, Dr. Chaffin and around a third of the chapter enlisted. Shortly after joining the navy, Dr. Chaffin was amazingly able to learn fluent Japanese which propelled him to serve as a vital intelligence officer in the Pacific Theatre. Following the war, he returned home to become a professor at the University of Alabama. He soon returned to teach at UGA in 1957, where he received tenure and took the opportunity to earn a Doctorate in the Science of Law from Yale.

Throughout his entire life, Verner maintained a youthful charisma that was both humorous and timeless. **Regent John Hearn (M 2000)** recalls a conversation with Dr. Chaffin when he had just moved into an assisted living home after living at his house in Five Points for close to 60 years. "He said he had to move [out of the retirement home] because there were too many old people in there". To put the conversation in perspective, Dr. Chaffin was over 90 when the conversation he had with John took place. It is likely that Dr. Chaffin was not referring to actual age of the people living in the assisted living home, rather he was referring to spirit. Dr. Chaffin simply did not feel at home at the assisted living home because he was a youthful soul. **Clayton Cox (M 2305)** also recalls a humorous experience with Dr. Chaffin: "One time he was giving advice at Commanders' Dinner sitting there telling a story: 'I remember receiving a phone call at the [Sigma Nu] house and I remember talking to them...' as he was speaking he was using both his hands to imitate using an antique phone!"

Dr. Chaffin's commitment to excellence continued in his legal career as he was awarded the Distinguished Service Scroll Award by the Law School Association for his commitment to furthering the mission of the school. He served as secretary of the Law School's Alumni Association for 29 years. He was also recognized for his contributions to the legal field by receiving the Author's Court Award for Outstanding Legal Writing by a member of the State Bar of Georgia. Later in 2012, he received the American Law Institute's 50-year membership medallion for his long-standing service to this prestigious legal education society.

Hundreds of initiates were knighted under Dr. Chaffin's watch and as probably one of the best known UGA law professors in the past 70 years, Dr. Chaffin taught notable Sigma Nu's like

E.H. Cullpepper (M 1166), Judge George Hearn (M 1845), and M.T. Simmons (M 1055). Furthermore, Dr. Chaffin was

instrumental in the revitalization of the chapter as he co-chaired



the capital campaign in 2007- 2008 to build the new Chateau. From the long list of awards and achievements, his dedicated service to our country, his distinguished role as a professor at UGA, and continued service to the chapter, he will remain a timeless reflection upon his legacy. While the brothers of Mu Chapter mourn the loss of this might oak, Verner Chaffin will be remembered for his generosity of spirit and life-long commitment to Love, Honor, and Truth.

After brother **Cameron Fearon (M 2719)** passed away from metastatic melanoma cancer, his pledge class and the entire chapter felt they needed to honor Cameron's life and time as a Sigma Nu. Brother **Colin Beecham (M 2694)** felt a calling to honor Cameron after talking to Cameron over the summer about starting a Jam Band concert for a good cause. That Monday after Cameron passed, Colin brought up to the chapter the idea of hosting a battle of the bands style concert between local bands to fulfil Cameron's idea to start a philanthropic jam band concert. Colin received immediate support from the chapter and paired up with brother **Matthew Brown (M 2701)** to devise and plan Jam for Cam. Shortly after, the chapter started an extensive campaign to fundraise for the event. Each brother in the chapter raised or donated \$100 of their own money to help start the campaign. Many brothers continued to raise donations through reaching out to relatives, friends, and anyone who found a calling to contribute to the cause. Colin launched a Gofundme campaign for Jam for Cam that quickly exceeded expectations. In the first 5 days, the Gofundme raised over \$14,000 and after 2 months brought in a total of \$23,593.

While Jam for Cam was immensely supported from the start, there were numerous obstacles that the chapter faced along the way. Namely, Jam for Cam was almost canceled on over five separate occasions. Choice of location proved another issue as there was considerable debate as whether to host the event in front of the Sigma Nu house in the parking lot of Greek Park Circle, or at the Sigma Alpha Epsilon Fraternity house. Many great points were brought up for hosting the event at each location, however the chapter came to the consensus that S.A.E.'s lawn would provide a much larger space, allowing more people to attend. Consequently, more people would be able to celebrate the memory of Cameron while allowing for the event to raise more money for the Melanoma Research Society. The choice of location proved worthwhile as over 5,400 wristbands were sold in the weeks leading up to Jam for Cam and over 7,000 people came out on November 9th to show their support for Cameron. Brother **Sean Lynch (M 2753)** can testify as to the number of attendees after manning the gates into the house. After surpassing maximum capacity for the house, one of the members of the security detail working the event alongside Sean turned to Sean and exclaimed "you're on your own from here buddy", leaving Sean to hold back the hundreds of people anxiously waiting to be let in.

TRIBUTE TO CAMERON FEARON

M 2719

Almost exactly one year after he became a part of the Fall 2018 Candidate Class,

Cameron Richards Fearon (M 2719) passed away from metastatic melanoma on Friday, August 17th of this year. While Cameron had received his diagnosis his senior year of high school, he chose to pursue his freshman year at the University of Georgia undeterred. To him cancer was really nothing more than a nuisance or a roadblock that he believed he was bound to overcome. Cameron rarely, if ever, brought up his cancer. In the two years Cameron



battled cancer, his father only recalled one time he ever complained about cancer; around the time his doctors were still trying to diagnose him, Cameron said "please no, not again" to his father, referencing the first time he had melanoma while in middle school. While Cameron seldom complained about what he was going thorough, he was not without his fair share of hardships. One day during his senior year in high school, he was feeling particularly sick and his parents took him to the hospital. That night he ran a 106-degree fever and the doctors were uncertain if that night would be his last. Miraculously, Cameron pulled through the night and made a complete recovery. Cameron's high school friends made sure to be by his side through the difficult times. One of the days that Cameron was to undergo chemotherapy, 16 of his close friends including brother **Anthony Mazzeo (M 2705)** left school to support Cameron through the process.

During his time at the University of Georgia, Cameron was never alone. He spent about every waking hour of the day accompanied by his friends. He was always with a brother either playing pickup basketball outside the house, studying in the alumni room, out on a Phi Mu date night along with his brothers, or up at 8AM Saturday at the house excited to see the Dawgs in Sanford Stadium. Lastly, Cameron was never without a smile and truly just appreciated life. Brother **Harrison Bernhardt (M 2733)** remembers one of the last weekends of the summer before Cameron passed where he and Cameron walked into Double and the bar was full of his brothers, friends, and much of the Phi Mu pledge class that he was close with. "After walking in, Cameron's eyes lit up and he said, 'I'm in heaven'". His time at the University of Georgia was heaven to Cameron. He had always wanted to go to UGA as a kid and had been a passionate Dawg fan his whole life. It was on nights like that summer night with his pledge brother Harrison Bernhardt in Double Barrel that made it so memorable for him.

From playing basketball at North Atlanta, to his time as brother of Sigma Nu and his active involvement in many clubs and organizations on campus, Cameron was able to positively influence an extraordinary number of lives. In a conversation between Anthony Mazzeo and Cameron's grandfather, Anthony recalls Cameron's grandfather explaining how Cameron had been able to influence more people in his 19 years on this earth than he had in his whole life. Cameron was also very involved in Camp Carolina, a residential boys summer camp that brings in campers and counselors from all over the globe. One of the particular traditions of the camp is the pursuit of being a "true gentleman". As part of the

tradition, campers receive a blank oar their first

year at camp. Over time, they earn brands on

their oar for exemplifying different aspects of a true gentleman. It is only fitting that Cameron was one the few campers/ counselors at the camp to have filled his entire oar with brands. Cameron's passing affected people all over the world. One of Cameron's camp counselors, all the way from New Zealand, felt moved to post a touching Facebook post about Cameron;

"My friend you will be missed by everyone who knew you. Such a strong, happy and caring kid. Long will you live on in the hearts and minds of everyone whose life you impacted. There is a star burning bright for you my friend".

Cameron's funeral was held at Northside United Methodist Church in Buckhead on Sunday, August 26. Mu Chapter was well represented there as brothers from all pledge classes attended to pay their respects to Cameron's family. A special thanks goes out to Cameron's parents who so generously provided transportation from the Chateau to the funeral and back.

Cam you will always be missed but never forgotten. Love you brother.

ALUMNI SPOTLIGHT

CLAYTON COX

The Chapter often highlights the "glory days" of Mu back when only the Kappa Sig house neighbored the Chateau on Greek Park Circle. Thousands of UGA students would attend Alamo Scout and the front lawn was flooded by students and alumni for tailgates. Mu's reputation around campus was sterling and brothers notoriously held leadership positions across campus. However, we much less frequently recall the harder times Mu faced. How the chapter literally went down in flames and nearly disappeared from UGA campus. How three transfer students from Georgia State University held the chapter together, slowly rebuilding the chapter one candidate class at a time. For many, it is hard to imagine Mu without a house on campus and Mu's reputation around campus all but washed away. **Clayton Cox (M 2305)** never had to imagine this time, for him it was a reality that he lived while an active at UGA and he will tell you it was some of the best times of his life.

In 2005, Clayton Cox pledged along with 25 others. Besides the 3 Georgia State transfer students, there was no pledge class above them to offer guidance. "We had to find creative ways to meet and get together for chapter." Even from early on, Clayton was undeterred by the challenges and adversity the recovering chapter faced. His freshman year, he ran for student senate when much of the student government was dominated by other fraternities. Losing a runoff for SGA Vice President was a wake up for Clayton which projected him to spend more time involved with the chapter in his upperclassmen years. He worked as rush chair and helped the chapter grow each year until the chapter had grown to around 90 actives by his senior year. That year, he was elected Sigma Nu Commander, Vice President of IFC, and even picked for Gridiron Society. Clayton recalls much of his role in the chapter was keeping up morale when the chapter did not have a house. Clayton was also instrumental in the campaign to fundraise for the current Chateau. He remembers pitching to alumni to invest tens of thousands or even hundreds of thousands of their own hard-earned savings to build a house for his pledge class. This proved an invaluable experience to Clayton's political career as it was the first time he fundraised for a campaign. Clayton reaped the benefits of campaigning for the house as he became first Commander in the new house.

Since his time at UGA, Clayton has gone on to get his MBA from George Washington University, worked on both President Obama's and Secretary Hillary Clinton's campaigns and worked his way up from DNC Regional Finance Director of the South to Deputy of National Finance for the DNC. While there are many Mu alumni working for different political parties in Washington, Clayton has never let politics come between him and his brothers. "There are many of us that work across party lines but we still all get together to watch the Dawgs each Saturday". Clayton's devotion to the chapter is a great reflection of what a Knight of the Legion of Honor should strive to achieve. Furthermore, the chapter remains grateful for Clayton's invaluable work to revitalize the chapter and bring back the Chateau to River Road.

DR. CHARLES BULLOCK'S 50TH ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATION

Dr. Charles Bullock attended William Jewell, a small college just outside of Kansas City. There he was Lieutenant Commander of the since disbanded, Beta Xi Chapter of Sigma Nu. While his alma mater chapter is no longer active, Dr. Bullock has been able to find a second home in Mu Chapter. Through his professorship at UGA, he has frequently spoken at chapter, furthermore, Dr. Bullock has been a valuable mentor to many Sigma Nus who have pursued political science careers. Dr. Bullock remember teaching students like **Buck Dixon (M 2326)**, Wells Ellenberg (M 2400), and Clayton Cox (M 2305). Dr. Bullock has managed to keep in contact with them over the years, and also keeps in contact with many of his other students as well.



Friday, November 30th, Dr. Charles Bullock's 50th year as a

professor of Political Science and Public and International Affairs at the University of Georgia was celebrated in Atlanta. In the past, Dr. Bullock has noticed that some of his student have not been able to pursue experiential learning opportunities because of the financial cost. Consequently, Dr. Bullock used the reception as an opportunity to help fund study abroad and internship programs for his students. Dr. Bullock has always made sure to help his students recognize the value that opportunities like internships offer. Dr. Bullock remembers advising Buck Dixon to take another semester at the University of Georgia instead of graduating early.

Much has changed over the 50 years Dr. Bullock has spent as a professor. 50 years ago, the student body at Georgia was consistently voting for Democratic candidates as the state of Georgia was voting Democratic across the board. Enter the '90's and University of Georgia students started more consistently voting Republican and more of his students were starting to become involved in clubs like College Republicans. Since then, Dr. Bullock has seen a more mixed climate among his students. Regardless of the political climate, Dr. Bullock has prided himself in remaining impartial in the eyes of his students. "I have heard that 50% of my students think I am probably a Democrat, while the other 50% think I am a Republican." To him, it's very important that he remains impartial so that his students feel free to discover and support the political affiliations of their choosing. His ultimate goal remains to help his students find success in their future careers; "The reason I do what I do is to try to shape the future, yeah I want students to learn what I teach but I also want to prepare them for success."

During his time as a University of Georgia professor, Dr. Bullock has received a long list of accolades and achievements. He has been named a Meigs Professor, the highest teaching award at the University of Georgia. Furthermore, he was appointed to the Richard B. Russell Professorship in Political Science in 1980. Dr. Bullock has also been involved in the writing or editing of over 30 books and more than 150 journal articles. Dr. Bullock is also recognized in the political science field as reporters and journalists frequently reach out to him for impartial advice regarding Georgia politics.
