Joe was with me at my two proudest Sigma Nu moments: my son's initiation at our Auburn chapter in 2008 and Mu's Rock Award presentation in 2010. MU CHAPTER WINS ROCK AWARD; BROTHER DURHAM INAUGURATED REGENT

Sigma Nu Fraternity held its 64th Grand Chapter in Boston, Massachusetts, and the event proved to be a proud one for Mother Mu.

Mu Chapter was represented by four voting delegates: alumnus Robert Durham (Mu 1650), Regent; alumnus George Ward (Mu 2308), Alpha Affiliate and past Collegiate Grand Councilman; Buck Dixon (Mu 2326), former Commander; and Chris Green (Mu 2367), former Lieutenant Commander. Also in attendance were alumnus Ernie Ward (Mu 1735), Alumni Advisory Board Member; alumnus John Hearn (Mu 2000), Alumni Adviser and House Corporation President; alumnus Michael Barry (Mu 2071), Alumni Adviser and House Corporation Vice President; and Wells Ellenberg (Mu 2400).

At the closing banquet on July 6, Robert Durham was sworn in as Regent of Sigma Nu Fraternity. In his inaugural address, Regent Durham announced his theme for the biennium: "Obligation to Excellence." At the heart of this theme is Regent Durham's observation that "there is no honor in mediocrity; honor can only be found in excellence." In order to obtain excellence, Durham announced the creation of "Task Force Hopkins," which will collect and distribute best practices from chapters nationwide. Brothers Hearn and Barry were appointed as the general fraternity's Grand Sentinels and will serve on the task force.

In addition to several other awards, Mu Chapter was announced as the recipient of the Rock Chapter Award. Based on the Pursuit of Excellence program, Rock Chapter Awards identify the best collegiate chapters nationwide. To be granted the award, a chapter must first attain excellence across a broad range of areas of fraternity operations including academics, athletics, leadership, and service. The chapter must then maintain that state of excellence for a period of two to three years.

The next Grand Chapter will be in Dallas, Texas, in the summer of 2012. We will provide updates as more information becomes available.

ALUMNI SPEAKER SERIES WELCOMES DR. CHARLES BULLOCK

On September 27, Mu Chapter was proud to host an Alumni Speaker Series event featuring Dr. Charles S. Bullock III (Beta Xi 658, Mu 2440).

Dr. Bullock spoke about the keys to success in college, as well as his favorite memories from fraternity life, to the active chapter and thirty candidates.

Though not a Mu alumnus, Dr. Bullock was initiated into the Beta Xi Chapter of Sigma Nu Fraternity at William Jewell College in Missouri. His father was also an initiate of the Beta Xi Chapter.

Dr. Bullock serves as the Richard B. Russell Professor of Political Science and has taught at the University of Georgia for over thirty years. In 2005, Dr. Bullock was honored as the Josiah Meigs Distinguished Teaching Professor, which is considered the highest teaching award at the University. In addition to his many honors, Dr. Bullock has published dozens of books and papers regarding policy analysis, interest groups, legislative politics, and southern politics.

This semester, Dr. Bullock received a Mu badge number in recognition of his tremendous contributions to Mu Chapter and the University of Georgia during his over thirty-year tenure.

MU CHAPTER RAISES THOUSANDS FOR ST. JUDE CHILDREN'S HOSPITAL

On November 26, Mu Chapter put aside its "good ol' fashioned hate" for Georgia Tech and teamed up with its Sigma Nu chapter to hold an annual event known as the Gameball Run.

Georgia Tech's Gamma Alpha Chapter started a seventy-seven mile, police-escorted run in the relentless, cold rain that would ultimately stretch from Atlanta to the New Chateau in Athens. A football was carried by the Gamma Alpha Chapter to pass on to Mu Chapter at an estimated halfway point in Lawrenceville. Once there, Mu Chapter completed the rest of the run. Every brother ran as far as they wanted before passing the football to another runner.

The two chapters combined raised approximately seven thousand dollars with donations from brothers, alumni, and corporate sponsors. All proceeds went to St. Jude Children's Research Hospital.

"We first contacted our Georgia Tech chapter back in August with some rough plans for the run, and they were immediately interested in cooperating with us. We coordinated police escorts and buses, and made a t-shirt and banners with our sponsors," said Wes Robinson (Mu 2373), Mu Chapter's former Philanthropy Chair and current Lieutenant Commander. "Everything went extremely well, and the run turned out to be absolutely flawless."

Both chapters used the football rivalry to boost involvement and excitement about the run by creating a competition between each other. Each chapter scrambled to get more donations than the other, keeping the traditional rivalry alive.

"The excitement and anticipation of the game allowed us to capitalize on the rivalry aspect. It made it a fun competition between brothers that went towards a good cause," said Shane Sandridge, Gamma Alpha's Philanthropy Chair.

The physical aspect of the run distinguished the event from others held by Greek organizations on campus. Mu Chapter brother Graham Kellams (Mu 2413) commented on the running experience: "It was really cold out, and I was really tired from running, but it was good to know I was running for a good cause. Once we got into Athens, it was great to see everyone on Broad Street cheering us on. It was an excellent way to raise money while getting everyone active and keeping the public involved in ways such as sponsorships and the spectators on the street."

Mu Chapter brother and Athens native Chris Green (Mu 2367) expressed his contentment with the exposure of the "other side" of the Greek system. "The Gameball Run was a great way for college students to donate their time for a worthy cause on their break and show a positive aspect of the Greek community," said Green.


Mu Chapter plans to do this event again next year and hopes that it will continue to grow larger.

A "MAN OF STEEL" AND AN AMERICAN HERO: ARMY LT. BOBBY WOODS RECEIVES PURPLE HEART

1st Lieutenant Bobby Woods (Mu 2300), a 2008 University of Georgia graduate and United States Army Airborne Ranger, was severely injured when his platoon was ambushed outside of Kandahar, Afghanistan, on August 7. Bobby was shot in the head by a sniper.

"He pulled out his own bandage and wrapped up his head," said Lieutenant Colonel John Fickel, a professor of military science. "He led the rest of the platoon as they defeated the ambush and then conducted the medevac." Instead of evacuating with the other wounded men, Bobby led the rest of the platoon back to base before receiving medical treatment. He returned home on November 20 and is recovering from his injuries.

"Bobby is an extremely strong individual," said former Commander Buck Dixon (Mu 2326). "Service is in his blood. He certainly puts everyone else above himself. When he makes a full recovery, he'll be chomping at the bit to get back over there and finish the job."


